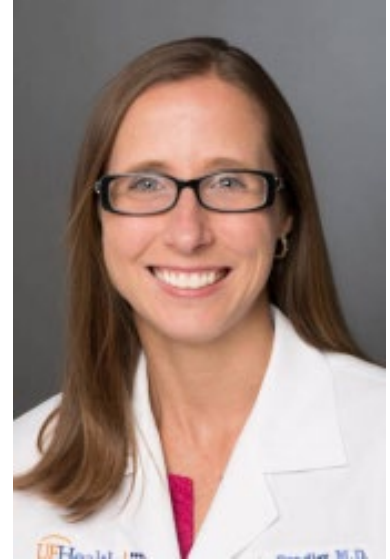


Julie A. Bradley, MD, MHCDS

Topic: Transitioning Between Residency and Early Attendinghood

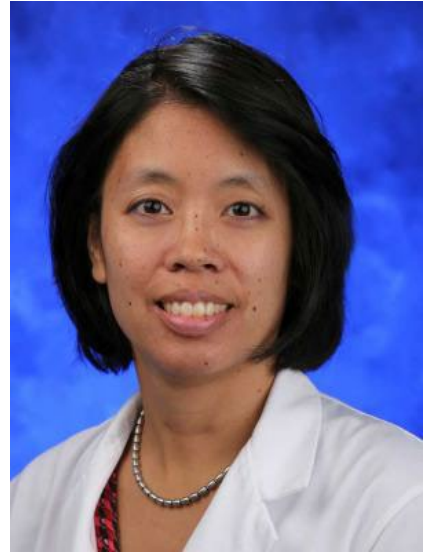
